Funding Update ●

> Trust for London

Trust for London is set up to fund small voluntary and charitable organisations in London. It funds organisations to identify needs and deliver services, gain access to training opportunities; organise meetings, conferences, seminars and events which identify problems. Raise awareness, explore solutions or promote food practice.

Funding up to a maximum of £10,000 per year is available for up to three years. They are particularly keen to help; black and minority ethnic community organisations; organisations providing creative educational activities for children and young people, including supplementary and mother-tongue schools; organisations run by disabled people for disabled people, including people with learning difficulties; people living with HIV or AIDs and people with mental health problems; refugee and migrant groups; self-help groups, e.g. children and family groups, estate based organisations, lesbian and gay groups, older peoples groups or organisations set up to tackle a specific issue, e.g. women's groups. Youth groups.

> FUTUREBUILDERS Update

The Futurebuilders Investment Fund, known as futurebuilders is a one off investment fund of £125 million which aims to increase the role that voluntary sector organisations and social enterprises play in delivering public services. The organisation officially launched on 5 May 2004 and its website has gone live. For more information and to visit the website go to <http://www.futurebuilders-england.org.uk>

The £125 million government investment fund being managed by a consortium from the voluntary sector. It will provide a mix of grants, loans, and capacity building i.e. support, training and advice, to the sector. The Government has now appointed an independent, voluntary sector consortium, to give out this money.

They are:

Charity Bank, the lead partner, is an organisation experienced in the provision of loan finance and they envisage that their investments will usually include some form of loan. Website: www.charitybank.org

National Council for Voluntary Organisations (NCVO) aims to give a shared voice to voluntary organisations and to help them achieve the highest standards of practice and effectiveness in all areas of their work. Website: www.ncvo-vol.org.uk

Northern Rock Foundation is one of the most well regarded charitable foundations in the country, their work covers the North East of England and Cumbria. Website: www.nr-foundation.org.uk

Futurebuilders aim to invest in the five public service delivery areas of: Community cohesion; Crime; Education and learning; Health and social care; Support for children and young people.

They want to fund around 250 organisations with investments ranging from around £30,000 to several million, as well as providing a number of development grants to help organisations work up their applications. Small organisations should not be deterred from applying. They expect the majority of their investments to be in local or regional organisations.

Open for applications have already started on 5 July. Their first meeting of the Investment Committee will take place as soon as they have some recommended investments to consider. They want to help you to deliver better services in these areas to sections of the community who deserve to see an improvement in their services.

They want to make some early investments in the summer and so will be processing the applications they receive in July as quickly as possible. If you are not ready to apply straightaway you should not worry. They will not start processing most applications until the **first window has closed on 31 October 2004**. The majority of its investments will be made in the second round, which will run between March and July 2005. A third or fourth round is being considered in autumn 2005 and spring 2006.

Futurebuilders plans to invest in around 250 organisations as well as providing development grants of around £10,000 to a number of other applicants. The value of investments is expected to range from £30,000 to £10 million. They expect the time it will take them to process applications to vary depending on the complexity of the scheme. Development grants will be processed in a matter of weeks. A complex scheme could require several months. They will keep you informed of their progress. You will have a named member of staff as your contact person throughout the process.

> The Big Lottery Fund

The Big Lottery Fund, responsible for rolling out more than half of all lottery good cause funding, came into action on 1st June 2004. The new organisation, formed from the New Opportunities Fund and the Community Fund, now moves ahead rapidly by consulting extensively with people across the UK on the direction of its future programmes. During the summer of 2004, the Big Lottery Fund will ask the public to help determine its priorities, how it will make grants, what types of programmes it will support and how it can work to deliver even more effective and efficient Lottery funding.

> £6.5m Boost for Better Business Ideas in London (LDA Grant)

Grants of up to £30,000 are now available for firms in several parts of the capital to implement new business ideas, as part of a two-year funding package worth £6.5m launched by the London Development Agency. The new money is designed to raise levels of spending on research by London firms whilst encouraging them to forge stronger links with universities or similar research institutes. It will fund three major new projects.

1. The £3.2m JumpStart Programme scheme, which will:

- offer grants of up to £10,000 to small businesses in London to develop new products, streamline their processes or increase their productivity in other ways
- set up six pilot projects to help firms, especially those with women, disabled or ethnic minority owners, overcome existing barriers to innovation and enable them to gain better access to research institutes and other useful sources of knowledge
- support a number of business networks that promote innovation to enhance and strengthen their services, improve links between London's academic and business communities and increase access to business services for all firms.

2. A further £2m is being spent on creating the London Innovation Relay Centre to help individual entrepreneurs and businesses in the capital exchange information about innovative technological developments with their counterparts elsewhere in the UK and the EU. The new centre will act as a one-stop shop for innovators and will hold details of possible sources of finance and advice around the UK and EU, potential project partners, training courses and a wide range of other useful information.

3. The SME Innovation Support Programme, worth £1.26m, will enable small and medium sized businesses in deprived parts of the capital to get free expert analysis of their performance and specialist help to identify possible new business opportunities or technical improvements to boost their competitiveness. The SME Innovation Support Programme will run for two years and offers financial help to firms while they are developing new products and processes. A maximum of £30,000 is available to help bring new innovative business idea to market or implement the new process. (The SME Innovation Support Programme is designed to help firms in the London Objective 2 areas of the Upper Lea Valley, Inner East, Outer Thames and West London. For companies outside these areas, there may still be some level of support available.)

> Awards for All

Awards for All is a Lottery grants programme aimed at community groups, arts, education, health, environment and heritage projects. They award grants of between £500 and £5000 in a simple and straightforward way. Please note that Awards for All has different priority groups in each region. Awards for all - Website: <http://www.awardsforall.org.uk> N.B. Awards for All Wales only funds community, heritage, health, education and environment projects.

> Refugee Community Development Fund

This national programme ends 31 December 2004.

The Refugee Community Development Fund makes grants available to organisations that work in the UK with refugees and refugee communities, including those that provide services to asylum seekers. Applications are particularly welcome from smaller grassroots organisations, emerging groups and those for whom refugees are a new target group. Projects must be for the benefit of those with full refugee status (under the 1951 UN Convention), or those who have been given Protection on Humanitarian Grounds or Discretionary Leave in the UK.

Total Fund Value is £1,000,000. There is no upper limit on the amount of funding which organisations can bid for, but funding will be distributed in a way which ensures that as many groups as possible are able to benefit. Given the total amount of funding available and the likely number of requests, the maximum grant value of £5000 is given as a rough ceiling to guide applicants.

Generally, three types of activity will be funded, though this is not intended to be an exhaustive list:

Start up costs - Funds may be provided to newly emerging groups to meet the cost of furniture, IT and other office equipment, stationery and reimbursement of volunteers expenses. Funds could also be used as a contribution towards the cost of renting premises for a short period, but not on a long-term basis. All applications must be supported by an independent referee and include the required enclosures.

> Local Network Fund for Children and Young People

This scheme closes 18 March 2006.

The Local Network Fund for Children and Young People provides grants to small, local community groups in England to support vulnerable children and young people. The Fund aims to counter child poverty and youth disadvantage by providing opportunities for children and young people to achieve their potential. Total Fund Value is £40,000,000 with average grant value £5,000, (minimum: £250, maximum: £12,000). Most grants will range between £250 and £7,000, for one year's funding only. Two-year funding may be awarded to projects in exceptional circumstances. The maximum two-year grant is £6,000 each year for two years.

> Health – Healthy Lifestyle Grants

The Lifestyle Grants programme was launched in 2001 and has an objective to support lifestyle interventions in communities to prevent or reduce the risk factors of heart disease. We award grants from £1,000 to £10,000 that are one off, or for the first year. Part funding is also acceptable.

To apply, interested parties are required to send by email an outline proposal that meets the guidelines provided with the application form. There is no closing date although grants are awarded twice a year in May and November.

Who Can Apply? Community Organisations, Inter-sectoral partnerships, Community Researchers, Which Grant Applications are considered? Lifestyle interventions - physical activity, healthy eating and smoking cessation programmes that will help to prevent or reduce the risk factors of heart disease.

> Special Grants Programme (SGP) from the ODPM

The SGP allocates £2.25 million to support innovative work by voluntary and community organisations exploring diverse ways of involving people in improving the quality of our public spaces, and delivering on the issues contained in Living Places: Cleaner, Safer, Greener, the Sustainable Communities Plan and the Urban White Paper. The SGP is intended to assist these organisations and policy makers in learning the lessons from what works and how best to promote them.

SGP comprises a two-tier process. There is an initial Stage 1 outline application, and if applicants are successful they are invited to enter a Stage 2 detailed application (please note only one application is allowed for each organisation in any one year). Grant applications for Stage 1 must be received no later than Friday 08 October 2004.

Both development funding and strategic funding are available. Development funding must incorporate an element of work for up to one year that is aimed at building capacity and innovation for the applicant organisation. Applicants may not apply for both development and strategic funding in any one year. Total public funding for development projects, including any SGP grant, must not exceed 50% of total work programme costs in any year (total work programme costs consist of total expenditure estimates plus estimates of the cash value of contributions in kind).

Applications that contribute to the following will be given preference;

- Creating attractive and welcoming parks, play areas and public spaces
- Improving the physical fabric and infrastructure of places
- Making places cleaner and maintaining them better
- Making places safer and tackling anti-social behaviour
- Engaging and empowering local people and communities in creating and looking after their local spaces
- Tackling inequality and
- catering for children and young people

Applicants can also make reference to the five themes set out in the Urban White Paper (available at <http://www.urban.odpm.gov.uk/whitepaper/index.htm>)

- people shaping the future of their community, supported by strong and truly representative local leaders;
- people living in attractive, well kept towns and cities which use space and buildings well;
- good design and planning which makes it practical to live in a more environmentally sustainable way, with less noise, pollution and traffic congestion;
- towns and cities able to create and share prosperity, investing to help all their citizens reach their full potential; and
- good quality services – health, education, housing, transport, finance, shopping, leisure and protection from crime – that meet the needs of people and businesses wherever they are.

> Neighbourhood Learning in Deprived Communities (NLDC) fund

The Neighbourhood Learning in Deprived Communities (NLDC) fund is running again for another year from August 2004. Local Learning and Skills Councils (LSCs) have received their NLDC allocations for 2004/05 and are likely to be engaged in discussions with their NLDC providers. For 2004/05, £30m has been allocated to the NLDC fund: £10m as capital funding and £20m as recurrent funding.

Priority Criteria

The priority recipients are Voluntary and Community Organisations (VCOs) engaged in direct delivery of learning or working in partnership with other providers that are offering learning. These include those concerned with outreach work, learndirect centres, UK online centres, LEAs and local community centres.

Wherever possible:

- Preference will be given to partnership projects or projects with significant partnership working or partnership potential
- Providers should seek to demonstrate how they will encourage and provide progression opportunities, and to say how they will encourage learners to pursue further activity.

The priority aim of the NLDC fund is to seek new providers and build their capacity and attracting VCOs seeking to supply effective learning and to get to 'hard to reach' learners, including:

- Learning for Community and Neighbourhood Development
- Learning for and about delivering community learning
- Outreach and widening participation into learning
- Or other actions (such as refurbishing or enhancing existing premises used for neighbourhood learning; contributing to the establishment of new neighbourhood learning centres where none previously existed; securing ICT provision for neighbourhood learning)

Local LSCs are free to determine the process to be employed for establishing appropriate NLDC funded activity in their area. Mechanisms and deadlines will therefore vary between local LSCs. Contact details of all the local LSC's can be found on this site www.lsc.gov.uk

> Arts Council - England

Grants for the arts are for individuals, arts organisations, national touring and other people who use the arts in their work. They are for activities that benefit people in England or that help artists and arts organisations from England to carry out their work. You can apply at any time until 31 December 2004.

They welcome applications that support the aims of decibel, the Arts Council England initiative that is working to strengthen the development of culturally diverse arts in England.

All the documents you need to make an application are available to download from their website.

> Stabilisation and Recovery

Their grants for the arts for stabilisation and recovery are aimed at larger-scale organisations which are central to arts provision in England and have a financial turnover of £250,000 or more with audiences in excess of 25,000 per year.

Stabilisation helps arts organisations to develop and re-focus their work, giving them an opportunity to put themselves on a more secure footing. These awards are made to help organisations develop their own stabilisation strategies and to provide the funding necessary to enable change.

Recovery assists key strategic arts organisations to develop financial recovery plans, in conjunction with their key stakeholders, which will enable them to secure their operation's stability in the medium term.

You can find out how the Recovery programme works, or read frequently asked questions about Recovery on their website. If your organisation is facing financial difficulty, you might be eligible for funding through our Stabilisation and Recovery Programmes.

> CULTURE 2000

This year's call for funding applications from the Culture 2000 programme has now been published. The call covers projects starting in 2005 in the fields of cultural heritage, the visual arts, the performing arts and books and reading.

Culture 2000 aims to develop better co-operation between organisers, artists and networks in the culture and arts fields, to encourage creativity and the exchange of culture between different countries. Earlier this year, it was agreed to extend the programme for a further two years. However, in future, all projects must address at least one of the following themes:

- the general public;
- the applied and creative use of new technology and new media; and/or
- tradition and innovation - linking the past and the future.

Particular attention will also be given to projects bringing together those working in the cultural field from the old European Union or European Economic Area and the ten new Member States and candidate countries.

For 2005, the European Commission will fund one-year specific innovative or pilot co-operation projects in the following areas:

- cultural heritage - around 50 projects;
- visual arts - around 20 projects;
- performing arts - around 50 projects; and
- books and reading - around ten projects, which can include projects to promote reading across Europe or to improve the translation of literary works.

Funding will also be provided for up to 19 multiannual projects in the same areas. All projects should encourage the mobility of those operating in the cultural field and the circulation of works and joint productions throughout Europe. Priority, however, will be given to those high quality projects which involve a wide spread of partners from participating countries or which ensure the widest possible dissemination of work.

Culture 2000 also provides funding for the translation of literary works. For 2005, the European Commission will support around 50 projects involving fiction written by European authors after 1950, giving priority to works written in less widely used European languages, including regional languages. It will also support around 20 projects involving the translation of works in the European humanities.

Finally, the Commission will award up to ten grants for projects involving co-operation with national institutions in countries outside the EU, EEA or candidate countries. These schemes can involve any cultural sector.

A budget of €28 million has been allocated for the 2005 Culture 2000 call. Funding requested for annual projects must range from €50,000 to €150,000 and must not exceed 50% of eligible costs. For multiannual projects, the grant requested should be between €50,000 and €300,000 per year and may not exceed 60% of the total eligible budget. For translation projects, EU funding will cover translators' fees for between four and ten books, up to a maximum of €50,000 or 60% of costs.

All projects should start before 15 November. Annual projects should last no more than twelve months and multiannual projects should cover two to three years.

Applications for funding for annual and translation projects should be sent to the Commission by 15 October. Applications for multiannual projects should be submitted by 29 October.

ALSO...

The European Commission has invited applications for funding for activities involving co-operation and networking in the cultural sector. For 2004, the grants will be used mainly to support preparatory projects and activities that will help lead to their selection for long term funding.

Applications are invited for innovative and experimental projects which adhere to at least two of the following objectives:

- increasing the mobility of those working and operating in the cultural sector;
- increasing the circulation of cultural products and works; and
- developing intercultural dialogue.



Funding is available for cultural operators based in the EU or European Economic Area. The Commission will provide funding of up to 70% of eligible costs from a total budget of €2.14 million for 2004. Schemes should begin before 31 December 2004 and last no more than two years.

Last year's call was particularly directed at training and developing networks in the cultural sector. The Commission funded six such projects.
