> **The Big Lottery Fund**

Big Lottery Fund Community Building Village halls and other local venues will benefit from the new Community Buildings programme announced by the Big Lottery Fund. The programme will be open for business by summer 2006.

The Big Lottery Fund will make £50 million available over three years through the Community Buildings programme to projects across England. More details about the scheme, including information about those who can apply and how will be released in 2006.

Community buildings act as a focal point for the community and are key to promoting community cohesion. There is an established need for more and better community-owned venues that complement state-owned facilities, such as libraries and extended schools. Creating or improving community buildings such as village halls will enable local people to make better use of facilities and encourage more activities to take place within them. Although money for capital projects is currently available through existing funding streams, the Community Buildings programme will focus solely on this aspect of civil renewal. Village halls and other community venues support a diverse range of activities. When they are well run and maintained, more local people are encouraged to become involved in those activities.

Once a community building has been improved, beneficiaries could include groups and projects who need space for public meetings, parent and toddler groups, fitness, recreation, arts, basic skills training, social events and more. Whilst this programme will inevitably focus on the capital aspects of community buildings, it will be the activities that take place within each building that are crucial and fundamental to its success.

The Big Lottery Fund are working with key partners to develop the programme and are in early discussions, but they expect that the programme will focus on ensuring that there is good community engagement in developing and refurbishing these buildings. In addition, they want to ensure good community use and encourage best practice in terms of management of the buildings. Historically, both the Millennium Commission and the Community Fund provided a significant level of funding for community buildings; the Millennium Commission contributed £50 million in the form of a dedicated programme, while the Community Fund has awarded over £138 million to community buildings since 1995. > **Comic Relief - UK programme**

Over the next four years Comic Relief are going to be working a bit differently. They want to further focus their energies and the money they have, so they can make an even greater difference to the lives of particular groups of people they think really need their support. This means having fewer grants programmes, and it also means they're going to put their weight behind these by joining forces with others to really tackle the root causes of the problem so they can help bring about lasting change. Of course, they'll continue to fund lots of brilliant projects all over the UK and are really looking forward to working with a wide range of organisations in the years ahead - some new, as well as some that they already know - but all of whom will share their passion for supporting people whose lives are really tough, and helping them to find better times. Red Nose Day programmes 2005-08 - This is their biggest grants fund. It awards some of the money raised from Red Nose Day. During 2005-08 they are concentrating their funding on 6 programme areas: Young people; Older People; Mental Health; Refugees & Asylum Seekers; Domestic Violence; Disadvantaged Communities

They can give grants for running costs and capital costs, depending on the programme you are applying to. There is no maximum grant size and the amount you ask for should be the amount you need. They are likely to make some large grants, and a range of smaller grants of between £15,000 and £30,000 each year. They also have a fast-track application process for small grants up to £5000. If you want to apply for more than £100,000 in total, please phone them before you apply. They usually make grants for between one and three years. In some circumstances, and where they are supporting projects that aim to bring about lasting change, they may consider longer-term funding of up to five years. Please talk to them before you apply for five years funding. Timetable for main grants over £5000 - There will be four grant-making cycles for 2005-2006.

Cycle Application deadline for grants over £5000: Cycle 2 13 January 2006; Cycle 3 5 May 2006; Cycle 4 8 September 2006. You should have a decision within five months of each application deadline. There is no need to rush your application. They will make sure they have funding available for every cycle. They will announce the deadlines for funding cycles in 2007-2008 towards the end of 2006. Remember, you can apply for a small grant at any time. They are likely to close all these grant programmes in 2008 and will give plenty of notice about the exact dates on their website.

Sport Relief grants - In the UK, Sport Relief aims to support projects that use sport and exercise to strengthen communities and provide opportunities for people who are excluded or disadvantaged. Over the next two years, up to £4million of Sport Relief money is being distributed through Community Foundations focusing on community groups that are using sport to: increase access to sport and exercise for people who face social exclusion and isolation; help people who are experiencing difficulties in their lives to regain their confidence and self esteem; and encourage people to take part in sporting activities that bring communities together.

> **Ford Britain Trust** (item supplied by The CIB www.cibfunding.org.uk)

The Ford Britain Trust makes donations to undertakings concerned with the advancement of education and other charitable purposes. Preference is given to registered charities (or similar) located in and working in areas in close proximity to Ford Motor Company Limited's locations in the U.K. These are Dagenham/East London, Essex, Merseyside, South Wales, Southampton, Daventry and Leamington Spa. Special attention is given to projects concerned with education, environment, children, the disabled, youth activities, and projects that will provide clear benefits to local communities. Applications coming from, or relating to projects based, outside these geographical areas generally are not considered. National charities are assisted rarely and then only when the purpose of their application has specific benefit to communities located in close proximity to Ford locations.

Applications in respect of sponsorship, individuals, research, overseas projects, travel, religious or political projects are not eligible. Grants made by the Trust are usually one-off donations for a specific capital project or part of a project, typically items of furniture and equipment. Applications for core funding and/or salaries, revenue expenses, and major building projects are rarely considered. Grants normally range between £100 and £5,000. Applications in respect of new Ford vehicles are considered when two-thirds of the purchase price is available from other sources. Any resulting grant is unlikely to exceed £2,000, but in the case of registered charities, it may also be possible to arrange a reduction from the recommended retail price. Grants are not available for the purchase of second-hand vehicles.

The Trustees meet in March, July and November each year. Applications are considered in order of receipt and it may take several months, therefore, for an application to be considered. Although each application is carefully considered, the number of applications they receive far outstrips their resources and regretfully, therefore, the number of applicants that they are able to help is limited. Naturally the decision of the Trustees is final. The following guidelines may be helpful to you should you decide to apply to the Trust: applications should be by letter (we do not have an application form) to the address below, setting forth the purpose of the project; whom it is intended to help and how; why the project is important and necessary (how were things done before); how it is proposed to carry out the project; when it is proposed to start and to complete the project; the total cost of the project; how much has been raised thus far towards the total cost; the sources of funds already obtained and expected; examples of fund-raising activities by the organisation for the project; and the amount for which you are applying to this Trust; a brief resume of the background of the charity is always helpful; where appropriate, financial accounts and similar supporting documentation should be provided.

> **Online fundraising service tops £1 million**

Over £1 million has been donated to charities online through CAF's Tailored Efundraising service. Launched in August 2002, Efundraising enables charities of all sizes to accept secure, tax-effective credit/debit card and Direct Debit donations from their own website, without the need for a specialised trading and banking service.

Currently used by over 350 non-profit organisations, individual donations through the service have ranged from £5 to £10,000 and have been made from 100 countries including Australia, Belgium, the US, Canada and Japan.

Efundraising links a charity's website to secure donation pages which can be tailored to fit in with the look and feel of its own site. Working alongside World Pay, the leading e-commerce solutions company, CAF (Charities Aid Foundation) undertakes all the administration on behalf of the charity, from designing the donation pages, to processing gifts and reclaiming tax from the Inland Revenue. On average 76% of donations through Efundraising are made via Gift Aid compared to a sector average of 28%.

As well as UK sterling, charities can appeal for gifts in US dollars or Euros with further currencies added to their donation pages on request.

Charities are able to view statements of donations online, while CAF provides donor records and hard copy reports to further support their fundraising activities. In addition, charities are able to view donations being made through their websites in real time and a unique online tracking facility enables them to identify from which sites or emails their donations have originated.
