Funding Update

> NVEST TO SAVE (ENGLAND)

Improved energy efficiency in the public sector, and increased access to the arts and culture sector, will be priority areas for the allocation of 40 million pounds from the next round of Invest to Save.

Projects that support the development of energy action plans, improve energy efficiency in public buildings, and raise staff awareness of the cost savings from energy efficiency will be able to bid for £40 million of funds from June 2005, alongside projects that aim to increase access to arts and cultural events.

1. The ISB is designed to address gaps in the provision of public services, increase joint working across government; spread innovative ways of delivering public services; and improve the efficiency, quality and effectiveness of services delivered to the public.

> BIG LOTTERY FUND CONFIRMS NEW FUNDING PROGRAMMES FOR ENGLAND

The Big Lottery Fund has announced the first wave of funding within its new framework to deliver new funding programmes for 2005 - 2009, the first of which will be introduced later this year.

The level of prescription will be minimal, allowing a very broad range of applicants and projects to apply. The Fund has also committed to the principle of full cost recovery and will provide funding for all relevant costs associated with delivering projects supported.

- Voluntary and Community Sector Infrastructure (£155million)

Following the public consultation and detailed discussions with key infrastructure bodies, the Big Lottery Fund's Board has agreed that VCS Infrastructure should form a strategic funding initiative in England, covering financing advice, resource centres, developing generic infrastructure in areas currently without it, sharing learning and best practice, governance and cross sector partnership influencing.

- Children's Play (£155million)

Based on the recommendations of the report Getting Serious about Play, the Fund will invest £155 million in England over three years in the establishment of a strategic fund to create and improve local children's play spaces in areas of greatest need. Grants will be awarded to projects to develop, create, improve and design innovative children's play facilities with the aim of providing free local play provision for youngsters.

- Environmental Programmes (£354 million)

Funding programmes will be developed to enable the Fund to meet the outcome of "improved rural and urban environments, which communities are better able to access and enjoy." This area of funding will include £90 million of funding for parks, which will be run in conjunction with the Heritage Lottery Fund, building on their successful parks programme.

This extra funding will allow the programme to expand and provide support for a wider range of projects across the country. The remaining funding will focus on projects that support and develop community spaces; local community enterprise, including local food production and farming; and access to the natural environment aimed at the conservation and



enhancement of the natural landscape with improved access for everyone.

- Wellbeing Programmes (£165 million)

In response to the consultation process, which has identified a number of areas as having potential gaps where investment could be beneficial, the Fund has identified a number of priorities to support "healthier and more active people and communities". These will include encouraging healthier lifestyles through community sport, physical activity and healthy eating; an intervention programme for common mental health conditions; supporting sustainable and active travel initiatives, that will enable more people to walk and cycle as part of their everyday lives; and a focus on alcohol harm reduction.

- International Grants (£60 million).

The International grants programme will be increased to £20 million a year from next year. The programme, which will combine both demand-led and strategic elements, will retain its focus on health, education, natural resources and human rights while adding a new priority of economic empowerment.

> Phoenix Bursaries

Phoenix Bursaries are to support development activities in organisations which provide enterprise support in disadvantaged areas and/or to under-represented groups.

The objective of Phoenix Bursaries is to develop the capacity of these organisations to deliver enterprise support to their clients. Bursaries will do this by financially supporting development activities which the organisation would otherwise lack the resources to undertake.

These activities could develop the skills of an individual member of staff, or the professionalism and capabilities of the organisation as a whole. What all the activities will have in common is that they will enhance the breadth and/or quality of enterprise support provided by the organisation to its clients.

Phoenix Bursaries will be available from 1 April 2004 until 31 March 2006. However, should demand be higher than anticipated, the fund may be closed before March 2006.

> Erasmus Mundus

Call for proposals for the implementation of Action 3 in the academic year 2006/2007 of Erasmus Mundus, the Community Action programme for the enhancement of quality in higher education and the promotion of intercultural understanding through co-operation with third countries.

The Erasmus Mundus programme's overall aim is to enhance the quality of European higher education by fostering co-operation with third countries in order to improve the development of human resources and to promote dialogue and understanding between peoples and cultures.

The Commission will select high-quality partnerships between selected masters courses and third-country higher education institutions (Action 3). Each grant will amount to a minimum of EUR 5 000 and a maximum of 15 000 annually plus allocations for student and scholar mobility. Partnerships must start between August and November 2006. > Friends Provident Foundation

The Foundation focuses its efforts on addressing Financial Exclusion and has a two-part grants programme.

Part 1. New ideas

This programme provides an opportunity for organisations to learn more about breaking down the barriers to purchasing financial products and services.

The weight of evidence suggests that financial institutions cannot overcome all of the barriers alone.

The current wisdom is that partnerships between non-profit bodies, central government, regulators, local authorities and commercial organisations are the best way forward. They are also vital in tackling financial literacy and lack of understanding that leads to self-exclusion.

They will fund:

- Research and development projects, that seek to address financial exclusion
- 'Think pieces' and essays that explore new policy and practice solutions
- The setting up of new services based on research (seed corn only).

Projects are likely to be based in the UK but they will consider strong arguments made for an international dimension to projects.

Part 2. Market models

They know that there are local projects whose success in a locality could be replicated elsewhere. They want to offer these projects the opportunity to 'scale up' so that they can give more people in more places access to services - services that are already known to work.

They will consider transitions from local to regional and regional to national and national to UK-wide.



Sustainability of the organisations they fund under the market models strand will be a priority for them. They anticipate not only providing grants towards the project work, but also towards establishing strong organisations which can continue to deliver and expand these services in the longer term.

In addition, they would hope to draw in additional funding and support from other agencies.

Organisations can apply for up to five years grant aid to secure:

- Technical assistance
- Business planning advice
- Project evaluations.

All work under this strand will be UK based.

> ADAPT Trust Grants 2005 for Arts Venues

Trust operates throughout the UK and its goal is to improve access by advising and assisting arts and heritage venues to create effective access for everyone. It does this through grant aid, awards for excellence, awareness training and a consultancy service.

The grants are for capital and long-term improvements in access facilities for disabled people. Improvements can include: ramps; toilets; induction loops; lighting; signage. Innovative projects are welcome. The grants will range from £500 to £2,000. Applicants must provide at least 50% of costs from their own or donated sources.

Applications must be signed by the appropriate official to indicate approval for the project/finance and should include:

- estimate(s) of project costs
- plan of the work with measurements (if relevant)
- examples of current publicity including details of access
- a financial summary of your organisation's last audited accounts

ADAPT can only assist buildings where the main activity is arts based.

Further applications from successful / unsuccessful venues will not be considered for a period of twelve months from the date of their most recent application.

> European Refugee Fund 2005 – 2007

The Home Office is inviting proposals for projects to be supported through the European Refugee Fund for a three-year period. Proposals are invited for projects that provide assisted voluntary return and reintegration; relates to conditions for reception; integration of persons whose stay is of a lasting an/or stable nature; and voluntary repatriation and other for appropriate categories.

The Immigration and Nationality Directorate (IND) of the Home Office is the Responsible Authority for the United Kingdom. The total budget available from the fund is expected to be in the region of £3.7 million in 2005 and will be matched with equal finding from the Home Office. Up to 10% of the total available allocation may be claimed by IND in order to meet administrative and technical assistance costs related to its duties as the Responsible Authority. Financial support from the budget of the European Communities shall not exceed 50% of the total project cost.

Target groups

The specified target groups for funded action are any third-country nationals or stateless persons having been:-

- i. granted some form of subsidiary protection, such as Humanitarian Protection, Discretionary Leave or Exceptional leave
- ii. granted temporary protection for a limited period; and
- iii. those who have applied for one of the forms of protection covered at I and ii above.

The Fund is open to proposals from national, regional and local authorities, international organisations, non governmental organisations and other organisations working on a strictly non-profit basis. As a general rule, projects must take place on the territory of the Member States of the European Union. **The maximum duration for projects is 3 years.**

> Comic Relief

Comic Relief aims to make the biggest and best difference it possibly can, with the money you raise. To make sure they continue to do this, they recently reviewed all of their grants programs both UK and International, and have put together a revised version of the application guidelines. This means that some programs have closed and some, such as the older people program, are expanding.

The program areas for the 2005-08 UK Grants are: Vulnerable Young People - Alcohol, Sexual Exploitation, Mental Health Older People Domestic Violence and Young People, Refugees and Asylum Seekers, Mental Health Local People Tackling Poverty & Disadvantage. In Africa it will see them building on their work with families affected by HIV/Aids, as well as helping more children living on the streets in towns and cities.

The UK grants guidelines will be available for download on the Comic Relief website from 27 June 2005. A new self-assessment system is also in place on the website. The International guidelines will be published in the early summer - the date is yet to be confirmed.

> Opportunities for Volunteering

The next application deadline is 18 July 2005.

Opportunities for Volunteering (OFV) is a Department of Health scheme which distributes approximately £6.9 million per year to 300 local health and social care projects in England. OFV aims to enable local voluntary sector health and social care organisations in England to involve volunteers in their work. Volunteering England (VE) is one of 16 national charities that distributes OFV grants on behalf of the Department of Health. In total VE distributes approximately £1.75 million a year, of which £580,000 is in grants to new projects. Each year around 550 organisations submit preliminary OFV applications forms to VE of which only 17-20 will receive funding.

The Total Fund Value is £6,900,000 with minimum grant £10,000 and maximum £35,000.

Grant award amounts are at the discretion of Volunteering England and the 16 National Agents. 16 national charities distribute OFV funding on behalf of the Department of Health. These organisations are known as National Agents.

> The Wates Foundation

The Foundation aims to alleviate distress and improve the quality of life by promoting a broad range of social priorities with a core area of special focus. Some priorities reflect the interests of particular Trustees. There is emphasis on the physical, mental and spiritual welfare of the young and disadvantaged aged 8-25. Racial equality is stressed throughout. Grants are concentrated on projects in the Greater London area. Preference is given to projects that seek to comply with recognised quality assurance and accreditation schemes. Features of Foundation-funded projects: The work is about providing solutions to problems rather than making them more bearable; there is a clear sense of objectives, and of how to achieve them; the work may be novel, pioneering or risky - it need not be innovative for its own sake; a grant has a good chance of making a difference.

Foundation grants are articulated in five broad programme areas each of which has specific aims set by the Trustees: Community Support & Development; Aid to Ethnic and Immigrant Communities; Foundations of Society; Arts, Heritage and the Environment; and Areas of Special Focus.

The Foundation makes grants in two financial categories: small grants and large grants. The Foundation allocates £200,000 a year to small one-off grants of less than £10,000. It is expected that most of these grants will be of the order of £5,000. Grants may be towards a project or activity. The Grants Committee considers applications to the Large Grants Fund at one of the three annual grants meetings: July, November & March. Their periodic grants range from £10,000 up to £60,000, but are typically of the order of £30,000 to £50,000 depending on the nature of the project and the number of years. The maximum period of support is three years.

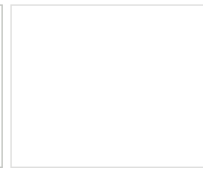

Over £1 million has been donated to charities online through CAF's Tailored Efundraising service. Launched in August 2002, Efundraising enables charities of all sizes to accept secure, tax-effective credit/debit card and Direct Debit donations from their own website, without the need for a specialised trading and banking service.

Currently used by over 350 non-profit organisations, individual donations through the service have ranged from £5 to £10,000 and have been made from 100 countries including Australia, Belgium, the US, Canada and Japan.

Efundraising links a charity's website to secure donation pages which can be tailored to fit in with the look and feel of its own site. Working alongside World Pay, the leading e-commerce solutions company, CAF (Charities Aid Foundation) undertakes all the administration on behalf of the charity, from designing the donation pages, to processing gifts and reclaiming tax from the Inland Revenue. On average 76% of donations through Efundraising are made via Gift Aid compared to a sector average of 28%.

As well as UK sterling, charities can appeal for gifts in US dollars or Euros with further currencies added to their donation pages on request.

Charities are able to view statements of donations online, while CAF provides donor records and hard copy reports to further support their fundraising activities.
