## Funding Update

### > CHANGEUP LONDON LARGER CAPITAL PROJECTS

The London ChangeUp Consortium is calling for expressions of interest in a capital fund for voluntary and community sector (VCS) infrastructure projects. A total of up to £1.6m capital is available to invest in larger capital projects between January 2005 and March 2006.

#### **The following types of spend count as capital:**

- The purchase of buildings and set up costs. In addition, revenue-type costs that are an essential part of acquiring an asset – such as the fees of lawyers, architects and surveyors, and any taxes paid, can be included as part of the cost of acquiring the capital asset, and so count as capital. Development and feasibility work, project management and wind-up of existing leases would count as revenue.
- The purchase or refurbishment of an existing asset, commonly a building.
- New IT systems and upgrading existing IT. The installation of hardware and associated software (operating systems and applications), the initial purchase of licenses and the purchase of databases would all count as capital.

#### **Possible capital work could include:**

- Co-location of infrastructure organisations including developing high profile hubs of infrastructure at all levels
- Upgrade of premises and resources, particularly work resulting in more efficient and effective facilities for frontline organisations such as meeting rooms, training facilities, media and ICT resources.
- Modernising the delivery of services through upgrading ICT within infrastructure organisations and supporting infrastructure to put in place integrated information technology.

When the Consortium has considered the expressions of interest submitted, selected projects will be contacted and encouraged to submit more detailed proposals for funding.

If, after reading the eligibility criteria below, you think your organisation is eligible to submit an expression of interest, please provide the required information by 3 December 2004. All expressions of interest should be submitted on a maximum of two pages A4. Any additional pages submitted will be disregarded at this stage.

#### **Eligibility Criteria**

- Only available to constituted voluntary and community groups in London
- Prime beneficiaries must be based in one or more London boroughs
- Projects must be strategic and demonstrate how they will progress ChangeUp aims and objectives
- Projects must have measurable outcomes
- Projects must specify who the beneficiaries will be
- Proposals must be for a minimum £50,000 investment from ChangeUp
- It is unlikely that more than one or two proposals for over £100,000 Change Up investment will be supported
- Projects that subdivide into smaller capital projects may be considered if they have a strategic purpose and outcomes
- Feasibility studies will not be accepted
- Projects must be able to start in 2005 and complete spend by March 2006

#### **Information Required**

- A brief description of what the project is and what it will achieve
- Who the beneficiaries will be
- Details of how the project meets all the eligibility criteria outlined above
- How you know there is a need for the project
- Contact details of the organisation, including a lead contact person, organisation name, postal address, email address and telephone number.
- Total cost of project including how much capital investment is sought from ChangeUp and who other confirmed and potential investors are.
- A timetable for the proposed spend, including start and finish dates

## > Consultation Fund (sponsored by DfES)

The Consultation Fund gives children and young people the chance to have their say about policies and services which affect them. Consultation activities are intended to allow children to contribute directly to decision making at local, regional, national and international levels. The goal is to give children and young people a voice on issues and the ability to 'make a difference', with the benefit of achieving better outcomes for decision making at all levels.

Activities must be for children and young people who reside in England and are 19 years old or younger. Funding is typically for events or activities lasting one or two days. Eligible activities include conferences, meetings, workshops and debates. Activities should have a clear purpose, allow participation in debate, and involve input into a decision-making process. Workshops or sessions which allow children and young people to participate actively should be incorporated into the activity. Activities which prepare children and young people to attend specific consultation events could also be included, for example, a session to give practical guidance on participation in a consultation event. Organisations are required to supply a programme of the activity with the application form.

Funding is not eligible for activities or events that: are organised by national or local governments and their agencies; cover training or ongoing projects; develop mechanisms for consultation, such as websites or involve a series of meetings.

Eligible Expenditure - Funding is to cover the costs of attendance at the activity including:

- travel expenses, such as standard rail fare, economy flight and petrol
- accommodation and subsistence costs
- delegate fees
- set up costs, such as rental of venue and catering
- carer costs, including childcare, to enable those children and young people with carer responsibilities to attend
- any additional costs for disabled attendees
- corresponding expenses for appropriate level of adult support workers.

The scheme is currently open to application received by 24th December 2004 will be assessed on 16th January 2005 and projects may commence from 30th January 2005. All projects must be completed by 31st March 2005, including time for evaluation and impact assessment at the end of the project.

## > Big Lottery Launches new grant programme for Young People

The Big Lottery Fund has launched a new £200 million programme to promote the well-being and personal development of young people across the UK.

The Young People's Fund will be rolled out by the Big Lottery Fund over the next three years. Under the scheme there will be three types of grant:

- Grants to individual young people and small groups of young people to fund community activities.
- Grants to voluntary and community organisations and partnerships between voluntary and statutory organisation to run local projects with and for young people.
- Larger scale grants to voluntary organisations to fund projects of national significance.

## > King's Fund

### **One for London Only**

The King's Fund is an independent charitable foundation whose goal is to improve health, especially in London. They focus on: tackling health inequalities and social injustice; enabling health and social care staff and organisations to work in partnership, across traditional boundaries; promoting cultural diversity in health; encouraging patient and wider public involvement in health and health care.

Small grants are given to support the setting up of new health projects targeting disadvantaged groups, or to encourage the exploration and sharing of new ideas in the health field, via publications, conferences and networking.

The biggest grant under this scheme is £5000, but most grants are for much less than the maximum.

They prioritise applications that: increase equity and justice: tackle inequalities in health; promote racial and cultural diversity in health; encourage public, user and patient involvement; promote better work across organisational and professional boundaries. There is NO open category for small grants. The Small Grants programme is aimed particularly at: small and new voluntary organisations and community organizations specific small-scale health projects relating to our priority themes; sponsorship of events/publications and other activities that aim to promote debate, spread ideas and share good practice relating to our priority themes.

Applications will only be considered from voluntary organisations with an annual income of less than £250,000. Applicants will need to enclose a copy of their organisation's most recent accounts to demonstrate that they meet this criterion.

Grants are decided by a Panel, which looks at applications every two months.

Development Grants: Most of these grants are given for work in priority areas identified by our Grants Committee. Current priorities are applications that:

Increase equity and justice: tackle inequalities in health; Promote racial and cultural diversity in health; Encourage public, user and patient involvement; Promote better work across organisational and professional boundaries. There is also an 'open' category The Committee meets five times a year, in February, May, July, October and December. If you want to apply for a Development Grant, send in your application at least three months before the date of the Committee meeting, and at least four months before you are planning to start work.

## > Refugee Community Development Fund

### ***This national programme ends 31 December 2004***

The Refugee Community Development Fund makes grants available to organisations that work in the UK with refugees and refugee communities, including those that provide services to asylum seekers. Applications are particularly welcome from smaller grassroots organisations, emerging groups and those for whom refugees are a new target group. Projects must be for the benefit of those with full refugee status (under the 1951 UN Convention), or those who have been given Protection on Humanitarian Grounds or Discretionary Leave in the UK.

Total Fund Value is £1,000,000. There is no upper limit on the amount of funding which organisations can bid for, but funding will be distributed in a way which ensures that as many groups as possible are able to benefit. Given the total amount of funding available and the likely number of requests, the maximum grant value of £5000 is given as a rough ceiling to guide applicants.

Generally, three types of activity will be funded, though this is not intended to be an exhaustive list:

**Start up costs** - Funds may be provided to newly emerging groups to meet the cost of furniture, IT and other office equipment, stationery and reimbursement of volunteers expenses. Funds could also be used as a contribution towards the cost of renting premises for a short period, but not on a long-term basis.

**Capacity building** - For organisations that want to strengthen their existing resources, typical support could include fundraising activities, publicity materials, consultancy exercises, feasibility studies, implementation of financial or quality control systems, IT training etc.

**New activities** - Established voluntary sector organisations or faith groups may wish to redirect their activities toward the support of refugees. Funding may be considered for providing support for training programmes, feasibility studies or seminars and conferences.

Grants are paid directly into the organisations bank account and must be spent within one year of receipt. Grants must be reported on in writing, showing how the money was spent and must be included in the organisations annual accounts, or statement of income and expenditure.

The Home Office Refugee Integration Strategy was launched on 2nd November 2000. The overarching aim of the strategy is to enable those who are recognised as refugees (or are granted Humanitarian Protection, or Discretionary Leave) the ability to play a full part in the economic, social and cultural life of the UK. It also aims to give refugees and their families the chance to fulfil their potential in the UK. The strategy also established funding streams to tackle the problems refugees' face.

The Fund will not provide grants for: Applications based outside the UK; Organisations which do not provide services to refugees (including those with Humanitarian Protection or Discretionary Leave) and refugee communities; Core funding or continuous running costs, such as staff costs, utility bills, routine repairs and maintenance, rent or insurance.

Projects will be evaluated against the following criteria: Purpose of grant (Start-up costs, Capacity Building or New Activities); Cost effective; Deliverable and sustainable.

To ensure that projects aid integration, as well as offering valuable experience to similar agencies, they will be audited to ensure that the funding is applied to the stated purpose

Applications can be submitted any time until 31 December to the address below. Payments will be made on a 'first come-first served basis' as the funds are limited.

## > Trust for London

Trust for London is set up to fund small voluntary and charitable organisations in London. It funds organisations to identify needs and deliver services, gain access to training opportunities; organise meetings, conferences, seminars and events which identify problems. Raise awareness, explore solutions or promote good practice.

Funding up to a maximum of £10,000 per year is available for up to three years. They are particularly keen to help; black and minority ethnic community organisations; organisations providing creative educational activities for children and young people, including supplementary and mother-tongue schools; organisations run by disabled people for disabled people, including people with learning difficulties; people living with HIV or AIDs and people with mental health problems; refugee and migrant groups; self-help groups, e.g. children and family groups, estate based organisations, lesbian and gay groups, older peoples groups or organisations set up to tackle a specific issue, e.g. women's groups. Youth groups.

## > Local Network Fund for Children and Young People

**This scheme closes 18 March 2006.**

The Local Network Fund for Children and Young People provides grants to small, local community groups in England to support vulnerable children and young people. The Fund aims to counter child poverty and youth disadvantage by providing opportunities for children and young people to achieve their potential. Total Fund Value is £40,000,000 with average grant value £5,000, (minimum: £250, maximum: £12,000). Most grants will range between £250 and £7,000, for one year's funding only. Two-year funding may be awarded to projects in exceptional circumstances. The maximum two-year grant is £6,000 each year for two years.
